ABOUT THIS DECK:

Welcome to “The Crowley-Waite Victorian Tarot”! You will find that in many ways this deck is unique among the vast assortment of tarot card decks. For instance, though the cards are modeled after the enduring “Rider-Waite-Coleman-Smith” deck, the pictures on the cards are photorealistic. Some of the images, like the Hanged Man, have also been reimaged to expand their intuitive, symbolic meanings. The design concept for the cards is based on vintage photographic cabinet cards, which were widely produced across the U.S. and Europe throughout the late 19th and early 20th centuries. In fact, cabinet cards became the most popular format for portrait photography during the Victorian era.

Another thing that makes “The Crowley-Wait Victorian Tarot” so extraordinary is that it was created from a collaboration between the photographic art and design of Garin Horner and the generative artificial intelligence of Midjourney. Horner was able to make AI composites using his own photos. He was also able to bring historical figures to life, like the namesakes of this deck: famed occultist Aleister Crowley and Arthur Edward Waite. In doing so, he fabricated remarkable photo-realistic imagery that stirs the imagination and awakens a reader’s intuition. In addition, there are other historical and mythical figures whose likenesses are featured as cameos in the deck. They are:

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ABOUT THE NAME “CROWLEY-WAITE”:

The Crowley-Waite Victorian Tarot refers to two Victorian era English occultists, Aleister Crowley and Arthur Edward Waite.



Aleister Crowley (1875-1947) was a highly influential and controversial British occultist, mystic, ceremonial magician, and writer. Known for his esoteric and spiritual pursuits, Crowley played a pivotal role in the development of modern Western occultism. Born into a wealthy family, he demonstrated early intellectual prowess and a keen interest in mysticism. Crowley’s journey led him to join various occult orders, including the Hermetic Order of the Golden Dawn, where he studied alongside notable figures like W.B. Yeats.

Crowley’s most significant contributions to occultism include the creation of Thelema, a spiritual philosophy based on the idea of individual will and the pursuit of one’s true self. He wrote extensively on occult subjects, producing works like “The Book of the Law,” which he claimed to have received through a mystical revelation. Despite controversy surrounding his provocative and unconventional lifestyle, including his involvement in sex magic rituals, Crowley’s impact on Western esotericism is undeniable. His legacy continues to influence various mystical and spiritual movements, with many regarding him

as a key figure in the development of modern ceremonial magic and the occult revival of the 20th century.

Arthur Edward Waite (1857–1942) was a scholarly British occultist, prolific author, and mystic best known for his role in creating the Rider-Waite Tarot deck, which remains the most widely used and recognized tarot decks in the world. Born into a middle-class family, Waite’s early interest in mysticism led him to explore various esoteric traditions. His involvement with the Hermetic Order of the Golden Dawn, like Crowley, greatly influenced his understanding of ceremonial magic and the Western esoteric tradition.

It was Waite’s association with another member of the Golden Dawn, Pamela Coleman-Smith*, that led to an artistic collaboration that resulted in the creation of the Rider-Waite Tarot deck.

This deck departed from earlier designs by incorporating detailed illustrations for each card, making it accessible to a broader audience. Waite’s emphasis on symbolism and his desire to create a deck with a deeper esoteric meaning contributed to its enduring popularity. Beyond his tarot contributions, Waite authored numerous books on occultism, mysticism, and the history of the secret societies, solidifying his reputation as a respected and scholarly figure in the realm of Western esotericism.

*The Rider Waite deck was first published in 1909 and for many years Coleman-Smith’s contributions to the creation of the deck remained unacknowledged. Today, the set of 78 cards is commonly referred to as the Rider-Waite-Coleman-Smith Tarot. Coleman-Smith is featured prominently in the Rider-Waite Victorian Tarot as the Queen of Wands.



ABOUT THE MAJOR ARCANA:

The Major Arcana is a distinct compendium of 22 cards within the larger collection of 78 cards that comprise a tarot deck. They are important for several reasons:

1. Symbolism and Archetypes: Renowned Victorian era psychoanalyst C. G. Jung believed that each card in the Major Arcana represents a powerful symbol or archetype that carries timeless, universal meanings. These archetypes tap into the human collective unconscious, making them relatable and relevant to people from diverse cultures and backgrounds.

2. Deep and Profound Themes: The Major Arcana explores life’s core concerns, including personal growth, transformation, enlightenment, and spiritual awakening. These cards are especially valuable for leading the questioner toward introspection and gaining insights into significant, universal questions about life.

3. Narrative Structure: The Major Arcana cards can be understood as a narrative that explores the hero’s journey as reflected through the questioner’s life challenges and triumphs. This narrative structure adds depth and coherence to Tarot interpretations, allowing a reader to guide the questioner through a meaningful, personalized storytelling experience.

4. Life’s Major Milestones: The cards within the Major Arcana are often associated with major life events, making them ideal for addressing important questions and issues. Whether it’s a crucial life decision, a significant change, or a quest for personal understanding, this group of cards can provide guidance, knowledge, and clarity.

5. Spiritual and Philosophical Depth: The imagery of the cards delve into deep philosophical and spiritual concepts, such as the pursuit of truth, the nature of destiny, and the balance of opposing forces. As a result, the cards invite contemplation and self-exploration.

6. Transformation and Growth: Many of the Major Arcana cards symbolize transformation and a personal growth that leads toward transformation. They suggest that change is an integral part of life and that challenges are opportunities for development and self-revelation.

7. Balance and Wholeness: The Major Arcana cards often emphasize the importance of achieving balance, unity, and wholeness. Their messages encourage individuals to integrate various aspects of their lives and selves, leading to a more harmonious existence.

8. Strong Influence in Readings: When Major Arcana cards appear in a Tarot reading, they carry a significant weight. These cards tend to underscore key messages and insights, drawing attention to the most pivotal aspects of the reading.

In summary, these cards are distinctive in the Tarot deck because they delve into profound and universal themes, offering rich symbolism and archetypes. They provide a narrative structure that addresses major life events and personal growth. The collection of Major Arcana is an invaluable tool for introspection, guidance, and self-discovery.

QUICK OVERVIEW OF THE MAJOR ARCANA CARDS:

0. The Fool: A whimsical image of a carefree person dressed in eccentric Victorian attire, embarking on a journey. The youthful character stands at the edge of a cliff while his loyal dog encourages him to pursue the adventure of his life.

I. The Magician: A mesmerizing portrait of a magus (magician). His right hand is raised to the cosmos while his left hand rests on an enchanted staff which touches the earth. He is performing a stance with which he unites the heavens above and the earth below.

II. The High Priestess: A solemn woman dressed in mystical clothing, she is surrounded by the radiant light of ancient knowledge.

III. The Empress: A regal lady, embodying fertility, love, and abundance, surrounded by lush gardens of fruits and flowers.

IV. The Emperor: The stern, distinguished figure representing authority and power is none other than the mystic Arthur Edward Waite, inventor of the original Rider-Waite-Coleman-Smith Tarot (published in 1909). Waite sits on a throne as the authority. In his left hand he holds the Emperor card from his own deck.

V. The Hierophant: A religious leader from the 19th century, sitting on the throne of spiritual authority. He is a divine intermediary, the bestower of blessings.

VI. The Lovers: Two young women share loving affection for the angel Rafael, who bestows the warm, protective embrace of his wings. The three of them share secrets while standing in a garden paradise.

VII. The Chariot: A noble champion rides in a vintage chariot pulled by sphinxes (sphinx cats), symbolizing determination, agility, and victory.

VIII. Strength: A powerful image of a Victorian woman with a lion. She has tamed the beast with the subtle qualities of her physical, mental, and emotional strength.

IX. The Hermit: An old spiritual master stands alone on the winding path of self-discovery. He holds a lantern, seeking further wisdom in contemplation and solitude.

X. Wheel of Fortune: This card features Khabawseker, the High Priest of Anubis, holding a Wheel of Fortune card from the traditional Rider-Waite-Coleman-Smith deck. Behind him is the mesmerizing wheel of fortune with various symbols representing destiny. Around the interior are the words ROTA, TARO, and TORA.

XI. Justice: Astraea, the Lady Justice balances right and wrong on the column of her own spine. Her expression communicates righteousness and impartiality as she measures reward and punishment.

XII. The Hanged Man: A thought-provoking portrait of a performer in suspension, contemplating their circumstances. From such heights he sees the world from a perspective no one else can.

XIII. Death: A haunting and mysterious image of the Angel of Death. He stands in front of a forest fire, signaling the end of one time and the beginning of another.

XIV. Temperance: The Archangel Uriel, whose name means, “fire of god”, is the angel of alchemy. In this image we see him mixing and blending various elements in pursuit of ultimate balance. A heavenly light emerges

from the background. It leads to knowledge of one’s higher self, purpose, and meaning.

XV. The Devil: Aleister Crowley captivates as the Devil. Throughout his life he personified the notion of half man and half beast. He represents the earthly embodiment of temptation and desire. At his sides stand two of his Scarlet Women, Jeanne Robert Foster and Lisa Hirsig. Crowley holds the Devil card from his own tarot deck, the Thoth deck.

XVI. The Tower: A stone tower sits on a crumbling, rocky peak. In an unexpected turn of events, lightning descends from above and strikes its parapet, symbolizing a sudden upheaval or revelation.

XVII. The Star: A woman stands at the edge of a pond. She is clothed not only by a flowing gown, but also by the dome of the starry sky. She holds a luminous container in each hand, from which she pours water to nourish the surrounding lands. With one foot touching the water and the other touching land, she connects the earth’s elements with the celestial realms.

XVIII. The Moon: A mysterious scene depicting two wolves howling as the full moon rises between towering trees. The sky is luminous, revealing the mysteries that would otherwise be hidden in the darkness.

XIX. The Sun: The radiant sun rises behind a joyful child who is sitting on a horse. On this particular summer’s day, light, warmth, and happiness prevail.

XX. Judgment: The Archangel Gabriel sounds a trumpet across earth. People rise from their graves, hands raised to the sky...ready for judgement. The event offers the possibility of resurrection or rebirth, symbolizing transformation.

XXI. The World: A woman dances atop a five tiered platform. Behind her is an oval portal leading to the past. Around the scene there are cameos of a man, an eagle, a lion, and a bull that represent four aspects of the zodiac. They are also the four living beings from Ezekiel’s final vision (Ezekiel 1:10).



MAJOR ARCANA – FULL MEANINGS:

The Fool 0



The Fool is one of the most iconic and intriguing cards in the Tarot deck, numbered as 0. It represents the beginning and the end, simultaneously. This card encapsulates a wealth of symbolism and holds a special place in the Tarot, signifying both a journey’s inception and its conclusion.

Image: The Fool is depicted as a young, carefree person who appears to be walking off the edge of a precipice. With openness and trust, he is about to step into the unknown. The fool is dressed in eccentric, mismatched clothing, suggesting their unconventionality. The pockets on the Fool’s coat hold collections of trinkets, which symbolizes the potential and experience he carries on his journey. His right hand is open to the heavens symbolizing non-grasping, purity, and innocence. It’s also recognition of a higher power. His left hand points toward his loyal dog and the earth, representing that which is below mirroring to the divine plan above. The action unites personal power and higher wisdom. The Fool’s gaze is directed upward, signifying a connection to the divine and a sense of trust in the universe.

Symbolism

Innocence and New Beginnings: The Fool is the embodiment of innocence and a fresh start. He represents someone who is unburdened by the past, ready to embark on a new journey with a sense of childlike wonder and excitement.

Fearlessness: Standing on the edge of a cliff or precipice, The Fool does not fear the unknown. Instead, he steps into it with a sense of trust, symbolizing the courage to take risks and make leaps of faith.

Unconventionality: The Fool’s unconventional clothing and accessories represent their disregard for societal norms and expectations. They follow their heart and intuition rather than conforming to conventional wisdom.

Trust and Intuition: The Fool is guided by intuition and his own common sense. He is also open to the wisdom of a higher power. He trusts in the path he is on and is unafraid to take leaps based on gut feelings.

Potential and Experience: His pockets contain all the potential and experiences he needs for his journey. The trinkets in his pockets symbolize the lessons and tools they have gathered along the way.

Endings and Beginnings: The Fool’s placement at the beginning of the Tarot deck and sometimes at the end (as the 22nd card) reflects the cyclical nature of life. Every ending leads to a new beginning, and every beginning contains echoes of what came before.

Reversed Meaning:

When The Fool card is reversed in a Tarot reading, it can indicate recklessness, naivety, or an inability to make decisions. It might suggest that one is not heeding their intuition or is unwilling to take risks. It can also be a warning to be more mindful of one’s actions and surroundings.

In essence, The Fool is a card that encourages us to embrace the unknown, trust our instincts, and embark on new adventures with a sense of open-hearted curiosity. It represents the pure potential and infinite possibilities that await us as we journey through life.

The Magician I



The Magician is a powerful and dynamic card in the Tarot deck, numbered as I, representing the first step in the journey of self-discovery and manifestation. This card embodies the idea of channeling one’s willpower, creativity, and potential to transform dreams into reality. It’s a symbol of empowerment, skill, and the ability to harness the elements of the world to achieve one’s goals.

Image: The Magician portrayed on this card is an Arthurian image of Merlin, a wise, old, and confident figure, standing on a path that leads out from the radiant bloom of creative potential. On the ground behind him is a book of magic, written and handed down by a long lineage of Magi. He is the living emissary of magic, supported by all those who remain behind him. Only this Magician can create its newest pages.

There are also four primary elements present in the card:

Earth: Represented by the ground upon which the Magician stands, symbolizing the material and physical aspects of life.

Air: The atmosphere through which the Magician waves his hand, signifying the power of intellect, communication, and rationality.

Fire: Symbolized by the Magician’s staff, representing energy, inspiration, and the transformative power of passion.

Water: Shown the Magician’s robes, which cascade and flow over his body. They embody emotions, intuition, and the realm of the unconscious.

The Magician holds right hand raised upward, connecting to the divine or universal energy, and the other arm pointed downward, symbolizing their ability to manifest their desires in the physical world. This dual gesture emphasizes their connection between the spiritual and material realms.

Symbolism

Willpower and Manifestation: The Magician represents the power of intention and will. He has the ability to turn his thoughts and desires into tangible reality through focus and determination.

Mastery and Skill: The Magician is skilled in his chosen pursuits, whether it be in the realms of creativity, communication, or practical matters. He has the tools and knowledge at his disposal to achieve his goals.

Transformation: The presence of the four elements signifies the Magician’s control over the fundamental forces of life. He can transform and manipulate these elements to bring about change and creation.

The High Priestess II



Featured on this card is the Sumerian High Priestess Enheduanna, a profound and mystical figure from the ancient world. The likeness embodies the feminine principle and represents deep intuition, inner wisdom, and the hidden mysteries of the universe. The High Priestess suggests a connection to the esoteric and an emerging understanding of the subconscious and the spiritual realms.

Image: The High Priestess Enheduanna is depicted as a woman of serene and regal bearing. She is seated on a throne which radiates light to dispell darkness. The Empress III

Growth and Transformation: This card represents the cyclical nature of life, emphasizing that all things go through phases of growth, transformation, and renewal.

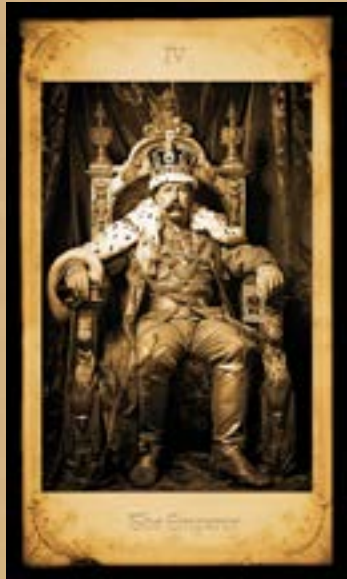
Reversed Meaning:

In his left hand Waite holds the Emperor card from his own deck. In Waite’s design, the Emperor is seated on a throne that is embellished with ram’s heads. This symbolizes his connection to Aries, the first sign of the zodiac and a representation of leadership.

Symbolism

Authority and Leadership: The Emperor is the embodiment of authority and leadership. He signifies the ability to take charge, make decisions, and exercise power effectively.

Structure and Order: This card represents the importance of structure, organization, and discipline. It encourages planning and adhering to a well-ordered path.

Protection and Security: The Emperor is a protector, symbolizing the need for security and stability in one’s life. He is a guardian who ensures safety and order.

Control and Boundaries: The Emperor embodies the principles of control and boundaries. He encourages setting clear limits and maintaining self-control.

The Hierophant V



The Hierophant is a deeply spiritual and traditional card in the Tarot deck. This card symbolizes wisdom, spirituality, and the search for higher knowledge. The Hierophant represents not only an origin, but a continuing connection to established traditions, rituals, and institutions that provide guidance and spiritual teachings.

Image: Featured on this card is a reimagining of Pope St. Peter, Prince of the Apostles. The Hierophant St. Peter, one of Jesus’ apostles, was the first pope of Rome. He is depicted as a religious-spiritual leader, seated on a throne, wearing ceremonial robes and a distinctive headdress. The throne upon which he sits symbolizes his authority. In his right hand he holds a shed snake skin, a symbol for the sins which must be cast off in order to grow toward the holiness of God. In his left hand is a “Pope” Tarot card, the predecessor of the modern Tarot’s Hierophant. This image comes from Florence, made by the Estensi court from Ferrara around 1460. This card displays two acolytes or followers at the feet of the Pope, indicating the teacher-student relationship and the passing down of spiritual wisdom. After the Pope card evolved into the Hierophant, it continues to be associated with the keys of

knowledge, emphasizing the importance of sacred teachings.

Symbolism

Spiritual Guidance: The Hierophant is a figure of spiritual authority and guidance. He embodies organized religion, moral values, and the quest for deeper spiritual meaning.

Tradition and Ritual: This card emphasizes the significance of tradition, rituals, and established practices. It encourages adhering to time-honored customs and ceremonies.

Teacher and Mentor: The Hierophant signifies the role of a spiritual teacher or mentor. He imparts wisdom, ethical values, and moral principles to those who seek his guidance.

Conformity and Structure: This card represents the importance of conforming to societal or spiritual norms. It encourages a structured and disciplined approach to life.

Seeking Higher Knowledge: The Hierophant is associated with the pursuit of higher knowledge and a deeper understanding of life’s mysteries. He encourages a quest for spiritual truths and enlightenment.
